Housing

Ann Arbor has a variety of housing options, including on-campus residence halls, co-operative housing, or off-campus apartments. Students are responsible for their own housing and should plan on making housing arrangements before they arrive. Students who want on-campus housing should apply for accommodation as soon as they are accepted. We recommend incoming exchange students apply for on-campus housing at U-M if possible, but it's important to explore off-campus housing alternatives and research backup options in case on-campus housing is not available. The Global Scholars Program (Isa.umich.edu/globalscholars), a living-learning community in North Quad, can be a great option for students looking for housing on the central campus. To apply for the Global Scholars Program, students must wait to be accepted into University of Michigan and receive a valid U-M email address.

Application Requirements

How to Submit Your Application

CGIS is the primary contact for undergraduate exchange students to LSA! If you want to be an exchange student at U-M, start by talking to the study abroad representative at your school. They can provide more information about the process and will collect required application documents to send to us via email before the deadline. All students applying will first need to be nominated by their home institution.

A complete application requires:

- Undergraduate Non-Degree Application Part I and Part II (signed and stamped by your home university)
- Official transcript
- Proof of English proficiency (learn more at myumi.ch/ZDkWZ)
- · Copy of valid passport

- Financial Resource Statement
- Certification of Financial Support (if needed)
- Supporting bank statements
- Supporting documents for I-20
- U-M Transcript Release Statement

After you are accepted, you can sign up for classes during the course registration period — please note that enrollment in all departments cannot be guaranteed as some courses fill very quickly.
