Created in 2017, this award recognizes faculty members who are exceptionally dedicated to the educational experiences of undergraduates in courses that serve the LSA R&E degree requirement.


The deadline for nominations will be in late February. Get a head start now on thinking about outstanding instructors your unit might like to nominate!




Crisis Democracy

Dear Colleagues,

I am pleased to invite nominations for the 2018 Provost's Teaching Innovation Prize. This award honors innovative teaching approaches that incorporate creative pedagogies. In 2018, up to five faculty projects will receive prizes of \$5,000 each.

Students, faculty, GSIs, department chairs, directors, deans, and staff members are invited to submit nominations for the prize. Faculty self-nominations are also welcome. Nominations are due by **Tuesday**, **January 30**, **2018**.

Examples of innovative teaching approaches include new approaches to creating inclusive classrooms, new uses of instructional technology, new ways to engage students in the learning process, new approaches to student collaborations, or new methods for replicating the advantages of a small course in a large lecture.

This program is open to faculty on the University's Ann Arbor campus.
