The office of Community-Engaged Academic Learning (CEAL) is open year-round to help faculty design and implement community-based learning (CBL) courses. CEAL is now accepting requests for various types of support, including:

One-on-one course design consultations.

- CBL Consultant to assist in all aspects of pedagogical research and course design related to the creation of a new CBL course. NOTE: Consultants can work up to 29 hours over the span of 2-4 months at no cost to the department.
- Community partnership creation and support.
- CEAL Course Development Grants ranging from \$500 to \$2000 to support the creation, implementation and/or assessment of those new courses.

NiNi Grants

We are also celebrating the work of colleagues who applied for and were awarded NiNi Grants that promote diversity, equity, access and inclusion in the classroom. As part of the LSA DEI plan we partnered with Instructional Support Services (ISS) to set aside \$400,000 to support creativity and innovation to achieve our "LSA Inclusive Classrooms" goals.

DEI New Initiative New Infrastructure Grants funding has been committed to 15 projects totaling \$391,284. Projects started this Spring Term 2018 and will be implemented in the classroom over the next two years. In addition to working with the faculty on the technology for the courses, ISS and the Language Resource Center will assist the faculty assess the impact of projects in meeting the projects' DEI goals, as well as work to scale the best ideas to other courses in those fields and across departments in LSA.
