This study sought to investigate how extra-dyadic behavior serves socially monogamous relationships. It was hypothesized that there would be a positive relationship between relationship longevity and extra-dyadic interactions (EDI's) using social media. It was further predicted that individuals in monogamous relationships who reported EDI's using social media would also report overall less self-expansion within their current primary relationship. Third, it was predicted that individuals would report less relationship commitment if they reported low self-expansion.

- Reviewed and compiled literature on social expansion theory, the effects of social media on relationship commitment, and efforts to maintain monogamy
- Composed a research proposal & recruited participants from social media sites
- Submitted IRB application and received approval
