Polish trumpeter Tomasz Stańko is "one of the most original and creative jazz trumpet players in the world," proclaimed the New Yorker. Inspired by early Ornette Coleman, Miles Davis, and John Coltrane, he was 20 when he formed his first band in 1962 and has been a jazz hero in Europe ever since. The Tomasz Stańko New Balladyna Quartet will present Balladyna, based on the Polish tragedy written by Juliusz Słowacki in 1834

and published in 1839 in Paris. The quartet includes Tomasz Stańko, trumpet; Tim Berne, saxophones; John Hébert, bass; and Jim Black, drums.

## From the Director: U-M Formally Recognizes the Copernicus Program in Polish Studies

ast academic year marked the 40th anniversary of the Copernicus Endowment, and we celebrated with an especially rich and diverse program. We also welcomed the establishment of the Copernicus Program in Polish Studies (CPPS), through which the University of Michigan recognized our excellence and contribution to academic life. For the last four decades, the Copernicus Endowment has provided support for rigorous, multidisciplinary analysis of Polish affairs, and the teaching of Polish language, history, culture, and politics. Since 1990, over 25 doctoral dissertations on topics related to all aspects of Polish life and history have been successfully defended by students who are now making their mark in their respective scholarly fields and public service. For all these reasons, the Copernicus Program in Polish Studies is widely regarded as the premier Polish studies program in North America.

We are proud to announce that we have signed an official affiliation with the newly opened Museum of the History of Polish Jews in Warsaw, allowing us to collaborate on research exchanges for faculty and pedagogic activities for our students. We are also honored to have received a grant from the Polish Ministry of Foreign Affairs via

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the Consulate of Chicago for our program activities. This year we are working with the Adam Mickiewicz Institute and U-M's Center for World Performance Studies on a Polish jazz series including performances, a mini-course taught by Professor Piotr Michałowski, and the Annual Copernicus Lecture with renowned musician Tomasz Stańko. Our exciting calendar of events also includes a Polish-Jewish lecture series co-sponsored by the Frankel Center for Judaic Studies as well as the prestigious "Martin Scorsese Presents:
