 - Apply to be a CAPS Peer Counselor
 - Project Outreach and Detroit Initiative
 - $\circ\,$ Volunteer for a suicide/crisis hotline
 - Intern for the Washtenaw County Public
 Defender (especially great for students interested in law or forensic psych)
 - Any service-oriented opportunity that provides transferrable skills, and/or allows you to interface with people in distress
- Interested in working with a specific population, such as children or the elderly?
 - Look for opportunities that allow you to interact with those populations now!

How do I know if I like research? -Get involved early! The longer you engage in research, the more responsibilities you will take on. -Use your time as an undergraduate to explore! You don't have to love every task, but should find a topic that is intellectually stimulating.
