Top row: Charles Ezra Greene (1842-1903), an American civil engineer. He served as quartermaster during the Civil War, and the U-M Engineering Department's first dean. Moses Coit Tyler (1883-1900), an American author, minister, and professor of American history. He was professor of English language and literature at U-M. Bottom row: Albert Benjamin Prescott (1832-1905), an American chemist. He graduated in medicine from U-M in 1874, and served as dean of the School of Pharmacy. Burke Aaron Hinsdale (1837-1900), minister and historian. He was chair of Science and the Art of Teaching at U-M, and the author (with Isaac Demmon) of *History of the University of Michigan* (1906).

Top row: Henry Clay Anderson (1872-1939), a mechanical engineer. He was head of the U-M Department of Mechanical Engineering. Charles Horton Cooley (1864-1929), an American sociologist, was the son of Thomas Cooley (U-M Law School). Cooley taught economics and sociology at U-M and is famous for the concept of the "looking glass self." Bottom row: Louis Abraham Strauss (1872-1938) was chair of the U-M English Department. Joseph Ralston Hayden (1887-1945) was professor of political science and served as vice governor of the Philippines in the 1930s.
