The theme semester in Winter 2011 will look at Afghanistan in context—regional, cultural, and historical. This will highlight the connections to neighboring states and among local social communities (including diasporas and refugees, ecological ties around waterways and mountain systems, and trade flows—both licit and illicit). The cross-cutting character of these connections throw into relief the cleavages that impede military and political stability in Afghanistan today.
