Michigan Learning Communities (MLC) are groups of students and faculty, often from diverse backgrounds, who come together because of shared goals and common intellectual interests. Those interests can range from community service to cutting-edge research and from mathematics to communication arts. MLCs combine the personal attention of a small college environment with the unparalleled resources of a large research university. Students thrive as part of a supportive and intellectually stimulating residential community in LSA—Global Scholars Program (GSP), Health Sciences Scholars Program (HSSP), Lloyd Scholars for Writing and the Arts (LSWA), Michigan Community Scholars Program (MCSP), Michigan Research and Discovery Scholars (MRADS), and Women in Science and Engineering Residence Program (WISE RP).

MLCs are built to achieve common learning outcomes. Michigan Learning Communities support students' academic success by:

- Developing students' sense of belonging and community within individual MLCs and across U-M's campus including opportunities for students to develop significant friendships.
- Facilitating connections between students' curricular and co-curricular interests and goals that foster personal, professional, and academic exploration.
- Connecting students to a strong network of peers, faculty, staff, alumni, and campus resources both as a transition to college life and throughout their college experience.
- Providing opportunities for students to engage in leadership practice, identity development, critical thinking, experiential learning, and applied learning.
- Fostering a long-term commitment to meaningful civic engagement and positive change.
- Supporting lived experiences of students across social identities and encouraging student engagement in exploring structures of inequality, power, and privilege.

LLOYD SCHOLARS FOR WRITING AND THE ARTS

Lloyd Scholars for Writing and the Arts (LSWA) is a diverse and creative living-learning community in which students are invited to "be creative, whatever your major." We bring together computer scientists and poets, digital animators and chemical engineers, sociologists and musicians, and build community through engagement with a wide variety of writerly and artistic experiences. Our programs include highly-sought-after courses taught by expert writing faculty, a robust arts curriculum for non-art majors, student-led clubs, a literary and arts journal, poetry prizes, community-engagement



opportunities, and outstanding visiting artists and writers.

LSWA STRATEGIC FUND

The LSWA Strategic Fund provides opportunities for student engagement that go beyond the scope of the classroom and the residence hall. These funds allow LSWA to bring in exciting artists and writers or to take students further afield for travelbased experiential learning opportunities. LSWA students help create community events such as FestiFools and Fool Moon, and new gifts could help fund the development of exciting future events. Funding could be used to establish a prize fund for visual and/or performing arts in LSWA to complement the annual poetry prizes, or to develop summer programming for LSWA students and community members such as a writing conference in Ann Arbor for young writers. Gifts of all sizes to this pooled fund make it possible for the program to respond to opportunities and offerings for LSWA students. LSWA's mission is to cultivate students' critical reading, writing, arts, and thinking skills, and promote the link between creativity and academic excellence, in a diverse and inclusive environment. After finishing their first year in LSWA, anthropology major Adrian Valbuena found that viewing history through the lens of the arts helps them understand their coursework better. "In my class about craft, for example, connecting gender stereotypes in crafting to how a language is perceived by people who don't speak it...there is a shocking amount of overlap that you can find between things that on the surface seem like they have nothing to do with art."

MICHIGAN COMMUNITY SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The Michigan Community Scholars Program (MCSP) brings together students and faculty who have a commitment to community service, diversity, and academic excellence. Through small courses, service projects, leadership opportunities, and social programs, students model an ideal community through intergroup engagement, responsibility, friendship, and collaboration. The Michigan Community Scholars Program is nationally recognized for its intentional and successful efforts to build an engaged, compassionate, diverse community emphasizing academic excellence, close faculty-student interaction, community service, and intergroup dialogue. Students work to make a positive difference as leaders involved in local, national, and global communities.



MCSP TRAVEL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The MCSP Travel Scholarship Fund aims to make domestic and international travel with the program accessible to all MCSP students, regardless of their ability to pay. This includes activities such as the GSP-MCSP-Inkululeko South Africa Service Trip, Alternative Spring Break, and May Service Immersion. Michigan Research and Discovery Scholars (MRADS) recruits and supports students from diverse backgrounds and academic fields to introduce them to the interdisciplinary nature of research and the excitement of discovery, to engage students in building a community based on mutual respect and affirmation of diversity, and to enhance students' undergraduate experience by providing them with academic and professional resources as well as engaging extracurricular opportunities to support their academic and personal growth. MRADS continues to be one of the only living-learning communities nationally for students of all academic disciplines. MRADS provides opportunities for first- and second-year students to enable their academic and personal growth through resourceful and innovative activities. MRADS creates intentional learning environments that provide students with soft and hard skills to equip them to independently define, create, and navigate their college experience.

MRADS MICHIGAN RESEARCH COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Summer fellowships would allow first- and second-year MRADS students to continue their research experience over the summer, regardless of their financial situation, enabling students to better assess their interest in pursuing research careers as well as their interest in the area of their research.
