Taking Your Place/Making More Space

I can only imagine what it was like for Marjorie Lee Browne as she pursued her PhD at the University of Michigan in 1950. As the first African-American woman to come through the doctoral program in Mathematics at U of M, she would have had to navigate and clear her own unique path to take her place at the table. Forty-five years later, I, too earned a PhD from the same department and I know that Dr. Browne's achievements made space for my success.

In this talk, I give an overview of my professional life with a highlight on my work in building partnerships between universities and industry. I will also talk about our efforts to ensure that a more diverse generation of young people with a diverse range of interests take their rightful place in our mathematics communities, and that there is welcoming space for them.
