SUMMARY OF ONGOING PROJECTS

Yamasee Landscapes Project | Beaufort, South Carolina | 2019 – Present | \$105,000

Principal Investigator — This multi-sited field, collections, and lab project builds a holistic view of 18th century Yamasee lifeways in South Carolina by connecting the materiality of daily life to broader social and political dynamics. Research is conducted in consultation with the Muscogee Creek Nation of Oklahoma and supported by national granting agencies. 30 students and 10 community volunteers have been trained in field and lab methods. Future research will continue investigations of a Yamasee council house, a Yamasee-Creek-British trading outpost, and compositional study of Yamasee ceramics.

Mapping the 'Indian Fields' of the South Atlantic Coast | 2022- Present | \$2,000

Principal Investigator — This project uses colonial surveying maps and environmental archaeology to reconstruct practices of Indigenous land stewardship in the coastal Atlantic. I have conducted archival research and collected soil samples from two properties with historically mapped "Indian Fields". Analyses of charcoal, pollen, and phytoliths by collaborators will evaluate evidence for deep-time land management strategies. These pilot data will inform an interdisciplinary NSF grant in 2026.

Brays Island Nature Center | Sheldon, South Carolina | 2023- Present | \$10,000

Researcher — I lead an interdisciplinary team to rehabilitate the legacy archaeological collections from Brays Island, a large residential property with a complicated history of cultural resource management. We are currently reanalyzing collections and digitizing records from a Middle Woodland village site and restoring a historic African American cemetery, in collaboration with the local community.
