LECTURER, University of Michigan School of Education, Ann Arbor, Michigan

Education 504

"Teaching with Technology" (Summer 2005-Present)

The course is intended to support a thoughtful exploration of some of the possibilities that exist for putting educational technologies in the service of student learning and effective teaching. Students will explore a range of practical technologies, including blogs, wikis, online surveys and rubrics, and will consider the utility, as well as taking a broad view of the historical and contemporary issues relating to educational technology. Students will have a variety of "tech workshop" experiences, in which they can develop their skills at using, for example, computer animation and mobile phone technology to enhance student learning. Students will also make presentations framing a number of current issues at the connecting points between educational technology and teaching and learning.

Education 463/Middle Eastern and North African Studies 591-001

"Arab-Israeli Conflict Simulation" (Fall 2003-Present)

This course, connected with a computer-mediated simulation activity, engages university students in supporting high school students who are portraying actual stakeholders in the present-day Middle Eastern conflict. University student "mentors" endeavor to support the students in the process of researching and becoming their characters, in determining the interests of their character within the context of their country's larger interests, and in carrying out the challenging tasks of representing well-known world leaders in this simulation about the complexities of international politics and diplomacy.

Education 462/Middle Eastern and North African Studies 591-002 "Place out of Time" (Winter 2002-Present)

This course, connected with a computer-mediated simulation activity, places university students in the position of supporting high school students who are participating in a historical simulation whose theme is conflict resolution. The university students must first learn about the historical setting of the simulation (Muslim Spain of the 8th through 15th centuries) and then "become" actual figures of that time who participate in a simulated trial as a means to explore questions of national identity, leadership, and the place of religion in society. Having gone through the process of becoming a historical figure, the mentors engage in conversations with student participants (who go through the same process) and endeavor to support them in the process of becoming their characters and being true to them.

Education 363/Middle Eastern and North African Studies 591-003

"Earth Odysseys" (Winter 1990-Present)

Taught every fall, this course engages university students as mentors for an online, discussion-based cultural studies exercise centered on vicarious travel. Mentors for Earth Odysseys must learn about the geographic and cultural settings of the trips they will be following, and then work with the students who follow one such trip each term through written reports from the travelers. In the weekly mentor "seminars, " our ongoing focus is on pulling apart the process of thinking through issues and formulating one's ideas or

opinions that we all undertake but, in this case, with the primary goal being to better support the students as they engage in this work.

Education 364

"ImagineNation Matters" (Fall 2005-Present)

Students in this class engage in project design, conceptualizing and then building interactive modules for upper-elementary students that explore significant events and places in the history and cultural life of our region and our nation. In the design work, we support our students in their efforts to create compelling spaces for project participants to explore issues of concern to people today (and tomorrow), while deepening their knowledge of the social and historical contexts in which those issues emerged. We make use of character play and story to both dramatize and personalize these events and issues, hoping to provide ample space for the exercise of our participants' creative imaginations. After completing their design work, university students serve as mentors, charged with using creative role play to help enhance an array of skills connected to writing, thinking and conducting research.

Education 365

"International Poetry Guild" (Fall 1989-Fall 2007, Winter 2009)

This course, taught both in the summer and the winter terms, engages university students as "mentors" for this computer-mediated writing project that involved young poets sharing and discussing their work. The mentors are challenged to read and offer written responses to the poetry that is posted, and to participate in online conversations with the poets about their work. The weekly mentor "seminars" are intended to support this mentoring work, by making a place for discussion of teaching and creative issues, reflection on their practice, and for a thoughtful crafting of a teaching "mission."

Education 650

"Reflective Teaching Field Experience" (2005-2008)

Conducted field visits to MAC student teachers, observing their teaching and discussing it with them in one-on-one meetings held at several junctures throughout the term. Facilitated weekly small group meetings in which records of practice were viewed and discussed, and where pedagogical issues of interest to the students were explored. Was responsible for reading and evaluating an ongoing series of reflective papers, and for evaluating their culminating portfolios and the oral presentations that accompanied those portfolios.

INSTRUCTOR, University of Michigan School of Education, Ann Arbor, Michigan (*January-April* 1996)

Education 392--"Education in a Multicultural Society"

Taught this required course for teaching certification candidates, which attempted to provide a survey of American educational history with an eye towards the ways in which schools and teachers have, and ideally might respond to students of diverse backgrounds. Was responsible for all aspects of course presentation, lectures and discussions, coursepack, syllabus and grading.

Taught portions of the core seminar relating to educational history, school finance, contemporary issues (school choice, purposes of schooling), moral issues and teaching, and the job search. Participated in admissions and placements decisions.

Taught classes and facilitated discussion group in this course that examined the philosophy, history, and sociology of American education in relation to its contemporary settings. Was responsible for grading papers and examinations, and facilitating web-based "Diverse Perspectives" simulation.

Taught technology courses to elementary school students, designed and adapted curriculum, coordinated planning with classroom instructors, planned collaboratively with middle school faculty. Designed and taught a middle school elective course on Contemporary Asia. Have facilitated a one-week summer course that involves technology, writing, sports and academic games for elementary school students.
